RAINES TO GIVE M. S. T. C. ADDRESS

PROMINENT MINNEAPOLIS MAN OBTAINED FOR COMMENCEMENT ON JUNE 1

Rev. Richard Campbell Raines, public speaker and minister of national reputation, has been secured to deliver the address at the Moorhead State Teachers college commencement exercises Monday, June 1. Dr. Raines, who is now pastor of the Hennepin Avenue Methodist church in Minneapolis, has chosen to speak on "Things New and Old."

Speaker for the baccalaureate vespers services will be Rev. Murray Allen of the Plymouth Congregational church of Grand Forks. His subject will be "Life Begins at Anytime." A native of New York, Rev. Allen received a large part of his education in Scotland.

An "alumni choir" of more than 100 voices, consisting of alumni and formerly members of the college choir, together with the present chapel choir will be a feature of the baccalaureate services which begin at 5 p. m. in Weld hall auditorium. It is planned to make the appearance of the alumni choir an annual event.

A full program has been planned for baccalaureate Sunday beginning with a "family dinner" at which graduating students and their parents, the alumni and faculty will gather. Later in the afternoon various faculty members will entertain the graduates at informal teas in their homes.
