Compulsory Inspection of Potatoes Provided

(Continued from page 1) The bill, which met with practically no opposition.

Abuses Cited "It was declared that abuses have been made of grading laws during the past several years and considerable stock has been shipped misbranded due to the fact that there has been no "teeth" in the inspection requirements and as a consequence other states have passed laws almost eliminating the Minnesota stock for planting purposes. Realizing this handicap, both growers and shippers banded together to pass stringent legislation.

The bill not only had the support of dealers who ship most of the stock, but also of the most prominent growers throughout the state. "Thompson Bros., Moorhead, Roy E. Douglas, East Grand Forks, O. J. Odgaard, Princeton and Charles Hechtman, Osseo, were among the prominent supporters of the bill and all were of the opinion that it would result in a much better quality produce being shipped from Minnesota.

To Train Inspectors "Chief Inspector Clarence Johnson and George Christenson of the federal inspection service stated that the new law would mean that several more inspectors would be needed to carry on the work but that work would be started immediately to train the necessary men to carry on the work. Inspection points throughout the state will be installed and every point will be taken care of as needed.

"There was some minor objection to the bill early in the legislative session due to the fact that many thought the idea was to institute compulsory grading, but this is not the case, only compulsory inspection being necessary under the present legislation. The bill passed and signed by the governor, reads as follows:

"Section 1. That all potatoes offered for sale or shipped for sale by any person in carload lots in the state of Minnesota shall be inspected by an authorized federal-state inspector to determine the grade, quality and condition of such shipment. Provided, however, that this act shall not apply to Minnesota grown potatoes between July 1 and
