About 80 attended the contest which was preceded by a family picnic. Recognition was given to the Gorman girls for having enticed their entire family to join in the picnic. MEXICO IS DESTINATION OF GROUP LEAVING HERE FRIDAY

Mexico their destination, 20 people will leave Moorhead Friday noon on a four weeks' trip. Professor J. R. Schwendeman of the M. S. T. C. faculty is leading the group, many of whom are taking the trip in connection with work in geography, a college credit being given for participation and subsequent reports.

Enroute to Mexico the party will stop at Pipestone to visit the quarries. Crossing the Rio Grande, they will first visit Monterrey, going no to Valles and thence to Mexico City. Eight days are to be spent in sight-seeing in Mexico City, 8,000 feet above sea level and the vicinity. Outside of the city, points to be visited include the volcanic Nevada de Toluca, elevation 13,120 feet. There will be an attempt to reach the top of the volcano.

The floating gardens at Xochimilco, Acapulco, the Atlantic City of Mexico, about 16 degrees north of the equator, the shrine at Guadalupe and Pyramids of Teotihuacan, also will be visited. At the time they are in Acapulco it is believed the city will be almost directly under the sun at noon when it is between 15 and 16 degrees north.

The trip back to Moorhead will include stops at Carlsbad caverns in Colorado, Pike's Peak, Garden of the Gods and the Rock Mountain National park, returning via the famous Trail road along the top of a mountain range.

Suicide Only Escape For Jews, Says Board

London, July 20. (UP)—Jews in Germany and Austria have been reduced "to such despairing misery that suicide appears their only escape," the board of deputies of British Jews said today in a resolution.

"Could there be any more damaging indictment of civilization than that the nation which in the past has prided itself for a high cultural tradition and learning has so degenerated to barbarism as to subject a group of human beings and full citizens whose ancestors have lived there for generations to treatment so barbarous that for parallels one has to go back to the dark ages?" the resolution asked.

Won't Have Employees 'Blackjacked' Into Union

Washington, July 20 (UP)—Charles M. White, Republic Steel corporation, vice-president, told the senate civil liberties committee today his company believed in collective bargaining but refuses to have its employees "blackjacked" into joining any union they do not wish to join.
