FORMER SERVICE MAN DIES SATURDAY IN ST. CLOUD VETERANS' HOSPITAL.

Barnesville, March 19 — Funeral services for Louis A. Haugland will be conducted here at 10 a. m. Wednesday and at 2 p. m. at DeLamara, N. D. 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ROTARIANS LEARN CLAY FARM FACTS

PRODUCTION INFORMATION PROGRAM CONDUCTED BY COUNTY AGENT PEET.

Facts about agriculture production in Clay county were brought home to Moorhead Rotarians this noon at their weekly luncheon gathering. The program, conducted along question-and-answer lines, was in charge of J. H. Deems, with Donald Peet, Clay county agent, as speaker.

Peet pointed out that the population of Clay county in round figures is approximately 23,000, of which about 11,000 are engaged in farming.

It was brought to the attention of Rotarians that about 2,400,000 bushels of potatoes are cultivated annually in the county, with an average cash return of 48 cents per bushel. Barley production totals 2,200,000 bushels, with an average return of 35 cents per bushel.

Peet estimated the oats production at 2,100,000 bushels, with an average return of 25 cents a bushel. The wheat production he placed at 1,000,000 bushels, with an average return of 80 cents per bushel. Sugar

beet production was set at 24,000 tons, at an average return of \$650 per ton. It was "Clay County Day" for Rotarians, with the menu featuring Clay products. Table decorations were made from vegetables grown in the county. It was announced that a joint luncheon meeting of the Rotary and Kiwanis clubs of the city will be held Thursday noon, March 28, at the Moorhead Country club.
