Company F Awaits Big Guns For Artillery Unit

First Lieutenant Donald Gates Returns From Training Course Today; Moorhead Guardsmen To Leave Sunday For Camp Ripley.

Although conversion of Minnesota's national guard infantry brigade was effective today, the Moorhead unit probably will not receive its allotment of 37-millimeter anti-aircraft guns for some time yet, First Lieutenant Donald Gates said today.

Gates returned early this morning from Camp Sheridan, near Chicago, Ill., where he attended a two-weeks training course in anti-aircraft technique. Members of Company F will have their first experience with big guns when they leave Sunday for Camp Ripley and their annual maneuvers, which for the first time will be changed from infantry to coast artillery. Camp will last until July 27.

National guard officers are not certain when the four 37-mm guns will arrive for Company F, Gates said, since that depends on the speed with which they are manufactured. Present supply is not known.

Meanwhile Moorhead will be supplied with 50-caliber machine guns, he said. As far as is known, Gates said, Company F will get equipment at Camp Ripley or soon afterwards.

The entire company will be mechanized. The 37-mm guns are mounted on rubber tired carriages and are towed by trucks. Mess, supply equipment and reconnaissance trucks complete the unit.

First week in camp was spent learning all about big guns, Gates said. Because Camp Sheridan had no 37-mm guns, members practiced on 75-mm guns, the famed French 75's of the World war, and on 50-caliber machine guns. All are fired automatically by instruments. "Each control instrument costs \$14,000," Gates stated, "and it is amazing how accurately they fire the guns."

His second week consisted of maneuvers and problems. "The unit thought nothing of moving 150 miles in a day," he said. "Guns and trucks usually moved at 30 miles per hour but at times reached 35 and 40 miles. They would be spread apart enough so regular traffic could be handled on the highways without difficulty."

Conversion of the company to coast guard artillery has also changed titles of officers. Captain Alex J. Nemezk, becoming battery commander; Gates gun commander in charge of both gun units and Second Lieutenant Horace Goodhue in charge of supply, mess and transportation. The company strength of 80 will be reduced to 75, there will be 70 sergeants and there will be eight corporals instead of 10. One corporal will be in charge of each gun, two in charge of communications, two in charge of communications and two altitude observers.

FARGOAN'S BODY FOUND IN RIVER

DEATH OF ALBERT V. ELLINGSON, 46, TERMED SUICIDE BY CORONER.

Death of Albert V. Ellingson, 46, Fargo, was declared a suicide today by Dr. F. C. Soper, Dilworth, Clay county coroner. Ellingson's body was taken from the Red river Sunday near Fifth street north by Moorhead firemen. There will be no inquest.

He had been missing since Friday and Mrs. Ellingson had notified Fargo police as he had been in ill health.

Moorhead police were notified at 1 p. m. Sunday by George Zora, 408 Fifth street north, that a body was floating in the river.

Ellingson had worked as a clerk in several grocery stores and was formerly a salesman for the North-ern Packing company of Fargo and for a Fergus Falls packing company.

He was born at Wendell August 7, 1893, and is survived by his widow, to whom he was married in 1929, by seven brothers and sisters: Elling, Barrett, Ben, Elbow Lake, Sigert, Crookston; and Ellerd, Edward, Mrs. Ole Christianson and Berntha, all of Wendell.

JUNE RAINFALL BELOW NORMAL

DEFICIT OF 2.30 INCHES REPORTED; TEMPERATURE AVERAGE DROPS.

Only 1.75 inches of rain fell in Moorhead during the month of June, Federal Meteorologist E. J. Fox reported today. This is a deficit of 2.30 inches. The normal precipitation for the month is 4.05 inches.

Total rainfall for the year is 6.16 inches, a deficit of 5.35 inches. Average temperature for June was 63.4 degrees, one degree below normal. The weather bureau today becomes a part of the department of commerce, Fox reported. It had been under the jurisdiction of the department of agriculture since 1891. Prior to that the weather bureau was operated under the department of war.

WOMEN IN HONG KONG EVACUATE

AMERICANS FILL PRESIDENT COOLIDGE LINER; BRITISH LEAVING.

Hong Kong, July 1 (UP)—Evacuating Americans filled the liner President Coolidge to capacity today while 1,900 British women and children crowded aboard the liner Empress of Japan as fears grew of a Japanese attack on this British crown colony.

Those who went aboard the Empress early had their first experience of war when they were served an army lunch—potato soup, army stew, bread, cheese and water from tin mugs.

The accommodations on the Empress apparently were the same as when the liner was carrying troops from Australia to Egypt.

"This batch is lucky," British military officials said. "There probably will be 4,000 next trip."

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Grand Army of Republic Head Commander Dies

Quincy, Ill., July 1 (UP)—The dwindling ranks of the grand army of the republic today mourned the death of their national commander, Captain John E. Andrew, 91.

Andrew died last night after a stroke. Born in Ohio, he joined the union army when he was 15 and served under General William Sherman through 15 battles. He was wounded at the battle of Peachtree creek in Georgia.
