Mock Battle Ruined By Uninformed Sentry

London, Oct. 2 (UP)—The trouble was that nobody told the home guard trooper about the mock attack on a certain key air-drome.

That's why Fall Mall clubs are laughing today and one unfortunate officer of a swank guards regiment is nursing a sore thumb.

A battalion of blue-blooded guards was told off to defend the air-drome against a mock night attack by another guards battalion.

All went well until the attackers, slogging through a marsh in utter darkness, came to a small bridge at which a home guard, armed with rifle and bayonet, was stationed. In mock battle style a titled guards officer crept forward, stuck his thumb in the home guard's back and said:

"You are now dead." But the home guard didn't know it was just a game. It looked like the real thing to him. Instead of falling to the ground, he shouted: "To arms! To arms! They're upon us."

The officer clapped his hand over the guard's mouth to muffle his bellowing. The home guard, fighting for all he was worth, bit the officer's finger to the bone.

When the officer got through swearing, the mock attack was called off for the night. They are going to try the maneuvers again soon. This time the home guard will be notified.

Nazis Can Halt Food Shortage

Economists Suggest Wheat Reserves Release

Stanford University, Calif., Oct. 2 (UP)—The nazis can prevent a critical food shortage this winter in the nations they have conquered by releasing wheat reserves to them, a report of the Stanford University food research institute said today.

The report, compiled by Economists Helen C. Farnsworth and E. V. Timoshenko, was said to have been the first inclusive study of world wheat supplies since the invasion of the lowlands and France.

If England can maintain her domestic economy and shipping, she will suffer only a "qualitative reduction" of diet, the report said. Germanized Poland, the Netherlands, Belgium, Denmark and Norway were threatened with serious shortages and Belgium was in the most serious plight of them all, the report showed.

France, the economists said, had adequate supplies, but faced serious problems of distribution. Wheat supplies in German-controlled areas were estimated at 120,000,000 bushels less than they were last fall.

"Common Cold" Is Health Worry

Outnumbers Other Diseases 25 To 1

Pittsburgh, Oct. (UP)—The so-called "common cold" was branded "the greatest health problem in industry" today by the air hygiene foundation, which issued a list of "do's" and "don'ts" designed to cut down losses by workers and employers from this prevalent ailment.

In the second of a series of industrial health bulletins, the foundation, supported by businesses interested in cutting down illness and injury among workmen, pointed out that colds outnumbered other disease, 25-to-1; that monetary losses to the average person total \$3,000,000,000 a year; that employees' losses are even greater.

The foundation warned that colds may be broadcast by sneezing, coughing, kissing, handshaking, or by using objects handled by an infected person; counseled victims to "cover your cough or sneeze," avoid infecting other persons.

Proper rest, food, clothing and exercise were listed as means of preventing colds, and the foundation warned against neglect of the cold, pointing out that "just a cold" may mark the beginning of pneumonia, influenza, scarlet fever, measles, diphtheria or other respiratory ills.

Vessels' Names Common To U.S.

Britain Re-Christens Transferred Destroyers

London, Oct. 2 (UP)—Forty-four of the destroyers which Great Britain acquired from the United States have been given names common to both the United States and Britain, the admiralty announced today, and the other six have been given names common to both Canada and the United States.

Two of the ships now bear names common to the United States, Newfoundland and the United Kingdom—St. Albans and St. Mary's. Names of six are common to the United States, the West Indies and the United Kingdom—Bath, Brighton, Charlston, Georgetown, Hamilton and Roxborough.

Twenty-eight have names of villages common to the United States and the United Kingdom—Belmont, Beverley, Bradford, Broadwater, Broadway, Burnham, Burwell, Buxton, Lancaster, Leamington, Leeds, Lewes, Lincoln, Ludlow, Mansfield, Montgomery, Newark, Newmarket, Newport, Ramsey, Reading, Richmond, Ripley, Rockingham, Salisbury, Sherwood, Stanley and Wells.

It had been announced August 17 that eight of the ships would be named for the following towns and villages common to the United States and the United Kingdom—Churchill, Caldwell, Cameron, Castleton, Chelsea, Chesierfield, Clare and Campbelltown.

The remaining six of the 50, which are being manned by the royal Canadian navy, will bear names of villages and towns common to Canada and the United States—Annapolis, Columbia, Niagara, St. Clair, St. Croix and St. Francis.

Franco Grants Amnesty To Civil War Prisoners

Gibraltar, Oct. 2 (UP)—Spain's chief of state, Francisco Franco, has granted amnesty to civil war prisoners serving up to 12-year sentences, in celebration of the fourth anniversary of the nationalist regime, according to a broadcast of the Spanish radio station, inaugurating a news service in English.

The broadcaster said the pardons affect "those who were compelled or who through their ignorance," fought against Franco.

Hague Blames Republican Unit

Ballot Box Burning Claimed GOP Plot

Jersey City, N. J., Oct. 2 (UP)—Mayor Frank Hague said today that the furor over the burning of Hudson county's 1937 poll books was "a republican plot to embarrass the democratic party and divert attention from fraud and corruption in republican-controlled southern New Jersey."

The burning of the books, disclosed last week when a legislative committee sought them for an investigation, was denounced last night by former Secretary of the Navy Charles Edison, Hauge-supported candidate for governor, in a speech at Princeton university. Edison charged, however, that the "sordid mess" of New Jersey politics was mainly the fault of the republican-controlled legislature for having confined its attempted reforms to democratic Hudson county, Hauge's stronghold.

The dispute attained national significance with the disclosure that Wendell L. Willkie, republican presidential nominee, had been issued a permit to speak next Monday morning in Journal Square here, where riotous scenes have occurred when persons opposed to Hauge including the socialist, Norman Thomas, have tried to speak in the past two years. The young men's republican club said a police escort would be provided Willkie.
