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MAN'S ENEMY IS HATE, SAY ACTORS

HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS BEGIN ANTI-WAR PLAY AT HIGH PITCH.

By CRANE ROSENBAUM One would last night as he watched 'The Enemy' at Moorhead high school whether it will be but months until in this country, too, "reason" is spelled with an added "r" when a pacifist speaks.

For though Channing Pollock wrote the play in 1924 he knew full well the World War was but the prelude to the present one and this one only a preliminary to the next. In it he takes us to Austria, shows that men there believed in the same things we did, fought us for the same reasons we fought them.

He shows us a youth who in June, 1914, wrote a play declaring man's only enemies were hate and greed, then died in March, 1917, fighting other enemies. He gives us the war's end with the play a success in that time when "everyone is a pacifist"—and ends with children marching to the sound of drums that will take them in their turn to what is called a "glorious death," apparently to distinguish it from death by natural causes.

The situations themselves are so dramatic that even reading the lines on the printed page leaves one shaken. The players began on such a high pitch, however, that with no place to go but up, the performance became at time over-dramatic, even over-loud.

Notable by contrast was the restraint of the scene in which Playwright Jack Christianson left, fearing a war that was to last a month, and in which he was to die three years later with decorations for bravery. Staged in the half-light of an early morning, the low-keyed performance was effective, made doubly so by Dolores Possel who in the joy of the month before the war, the despair of the years during it and resignation when it ended, called upon that silent speech named pantomime to portray emotion that would have been obscured by the efforts of others had she tried to express it verbally.

Donald Prindle did so admirably as a gay British student who'd found a place in the hearts of the Austrians that when he was called home to fight them, we couldn't quite believe his heroics about King and Country. Whether deliberate or not most realistic was the way in which were ignored the words of Dr. Arndt, the one man who never succumbed to hate. In peace-time everyone believes his philosophy, but no one listens to it, either then or in wartime.

All the parts were individually well-done, lacking only the blending that is probably impossible to achieve for any performance that is given but twice before an audience. The Enemy will be repeated at 8 p. m. today.

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USHA Homes Cost 10% Below Privately-Built

Washington, Feb. 6 (UP)—U. S. housing authority loans are building low-rent projects at an average cost of 10 per cent below those erected by private industry, Administrator Nathan Straus said today.

The average overall cost of a complete family unit in the first 166 projects financed with USHA loans, Straus said, is \$4,491 as compared with the average cost for similar units of \$5,024 built by private enterprise.
