

**FLIER STAYED IN CRAFT TO CHECK CRASH**

Washington, July 26 (UP)—Lieut. C. C. Champion, naval flier who fell seven miles to safety after his engine exploded, stayed with his machine to keep it from falling into the business district of the capital, it was revealed today.

Four times the craft caught fire and each time Champion blew out the flames, side slipping the craft to throw a rush of air at the engine. Each time he was ready to jump out and jerk the rip cord of his parachute, but he didn't.

The bureau of standards office sought to verify the probable altitude record but it was a difficult matter because one of the barographs was wrecked by the flames and the other was jarred by the vibration. Champion said his altimeter registered 47,000 feet—nine miles in the air and more than 6,000 feet above the record of Calizo of France—before he started down.

Heads of seven of the nine cylinders blew off and he came down "dead," volplaning into a corn field.

New York, July 26 (UP)—Mike McTigue today was recognized by the New York boxing commission as light heavyweight champion of the world.

McTigue stepped into Jack Delaney's shoes when the latter voluntarily forfeited the title to become a heavyweight.

**U. S. Has Three of Every Five of World Phones**

Three out of every five telephones in the world are in the United States where the per capita figure for telephones is nearly 10 times as great as for Europe or for the entire world. Out of a total of 27,783,963 telephones in the world on January 1, 1926, the United States possessed 16,935,918 telephones, 61 percent; Europe had 7,479,690 or 27 percent and the remaining 12 percent were scattered over the globe in Asia, Africa, Oceania, South America and countries in North America outside of the United States.

During the year 1925, the number of telephones in the world increased by 1,727,465 or more than 6 percent, a number exceeding the total number of telephones in the whole world at the beginning of the century. The figures used in the foregoing statement are taken from a recently published compilation of telephone and telegraph statistics of the world. Because of the time required to obtain authoritative data from the more distant countries, the most recent date

for which comparable figures are available is January 1, 1926. Since this date, the United States has added more than 1,000,000 telephones to its total.

Canada ranks next to the United States in telephone development with 12.2 telephones per 100 of its inhabitants. Other European countries follow: Denmark and New Zealand, 9.2; Sweden, 7.2; Norway, 6.3; Australia, 6.1; Germany, 4.1; Great Britain and Northern Ireland, 3, and France, 1.8. Germany ranks next to the United States in absolute number of telephones with 2,538,016. In South America, Argentina led in development with 1.9 telephones per 100 population. In Asia the majority of telephones are in Japan which had 1.1 telephones per 100 inhabitants.

A notable feature of American telephone development is the large number of telephones to be found in the smaller towns and rural districts. In communities under 50,000 population in the United States there were 11.7 telephones per 100 inhabitants. In Europe telephones are concentrated in the larger cities and rural development is almost negligible. London has more than one third of the telephones in Great Britain and Paris has more than one third of the telephones in France.

Not only has the United States more telephones than all the rest of the world but Americans use the telephone oftener than the inhabitants of any other country. There were 196 telephone conversations per capita in this country in 1925 as compared to 135 for Denmark, 107 for Norway, 106 for Sweden, 33 for Japan, 32 for Germany, 25 for Great Britain and 20 for France. There were in the United States during 1925, a total of 22,400,000,000 completed conversations—equivalent for one every second for more than 700 years.

**BALFOUR NOT TO TAKE PART IN ARMS MEET**

London, July 26 (UP)—A solution of the stalemated cruiser problem at Geneva must be found it was indicated today, without the assistance of Lord Balfour, 79 year old statesman of the empire. Balfour was unofficially nominated today to succeed W. C. Bridgeman, first lord of the admiralty and leader of the British delegation to the naval limitation conference.

Influential supporters of Balfour urged the necessity of reaching a speedy agreement if the conference were to escape a collapse. The United Press was authoritatively informed that Balfour because of his advanced years, would be unlikely to have any connection with the Geneva conference.

London, July 26 (UP)—Influential quarters today were urging the government to send Lord Balfour to Geneva in an eleventh hour effort to avert a break down of the naval armament conference. It was pointed out, however, that W. C. Bridgeman, first lord of the admiralty and head of the British delegation, would oppose the move.

The liberal Daily News in an editorial pointed to Lord Balfour as "the man to save the conference."

"It is specific enough," said the Daily News, "that when a few weeks ago it seemed that the conference might break down, it was immediately urged by many responsible men that the only way to avert a break down was to send Lord Balfour to the conference."

"Lord Balfour dominated the Washington conference as no Englishman ever dominated a conference since Disraeli brought back "peace with honor" from Berlin."

**Injunction Hearing to be Held Saturday**

A hearing will be held in Clay county district court Saturday on the permanency of an injunction issued by Judge Carroll A. Nye last Saturday to prevent the holding of dances at the H. E. Schroeder farm, south of town.

The injunction was issued at the request of Henry Larson who alleged that couples coming from the dance to his adjoining property created a nuisance.

**HOUSING CRISIS GROWS IN CAPITAL OF RUSSIA**

Moscow (UP)—The Soviet capital, already overcrowded, keeps right on growing bigger. In May it added 14,348 people to its population, making the unbearable housing crisis even more acute.

There were 70,373 persons who came to Moscow during May and 53,325 went away, while the margin of births over deaths added 2,300 to the net increase.

**150 Reported Dead in Typhoon**

Hong Kong, July 26 (UP)—One hundred fifty persons are believed were drowned when a large Chinese passenger junk, proceeding to Kong Moon from Canton, capsized in a typhoon.

Two launches were also sunk in the blow.
