

# Powerhouse Twins Win Second Half Title

## Even Break At Winnipeg Nets Necessary Margin

Connie Connell's Home Run In 10th Gives F-M Decisive 7-6 Victory In First Game; Second Hit, Won By Maroons, 19-13, of No Consequence.

Fargo-Moorhead's powerhouse Twins, winners of the Northern league's second half championship, moved into Grand Forks today to begin the formality of playing six games remaining on their schedule.

The Twins can lose all six contests and still top the league by eight percentage points when the season closes Sunday, even if Winnipeg, their nearest rival and pennant playoff opponent, wins all of its remaining eight titles.

The Twins clinched the second half title yesterday when they broke even with the Maroons in a Labor Day double header. The Twins topped the 10-inning morning contest, 7 to 6, but dropped an afternoon slugfest to the Canadians, 19 to 13.

The playoff for the 1935 pennant will get under way at Winnipeg September 11 and continue in the Manitoba capital September 12 and 14. The two teams will come to Moorhead for games September 15, 17 and 18.

Yesterday's double header brought to a close the bitter second half struggle between the two clubs, the Twins emerging with eight victories to three for the Maroons in their personal feud.

Towering Jack Andrews went the route for the Twins in their all important morning victory and seemed a cinch to turn in a victory as the two teams went into the eighth inning with the Twins leading 6-2. Then the Maroons rallied for four runs to knot the score at 6-all and the Twins were forced to pull the game out of the fire in the 10th when Connie Connell connected for a home run.

Connell Stars  
Connell was the batting star of the contest, getting three hits in five trips—two doubles and a home run. He batted in three runs. Gus Koch homered and Jim Shilling, Andrews, and Babs Johnson collected two-baggers.

The F-M victory was the first setback for Maroon Pitcher Lefty Bertrand in his home park.

The Twins started the second game as though they meant to sweep the double program, pushing across six runs in the first inning. Winnipeg came back with four in their half of the inning and from that point on the only interesting thing about the game was the parade of pitchers to the slab and hits to the dugout. A total of 41 hits were lammed off the moundsmen.

Walter Jensen, of Minneapolis, who made his Northern league debut in the Crookston-Grand Forks game Sunday, and Clayton A. Knutson, of Superior, classed by many as the league's ace arbiter, have been named to umpire the pennant playoff series between the Twins and Winnipeg.

Naming of the umpires was the last official act of Lute J. (Danny) Boone, president of the league and manager of the Crookston club, before he left Sunday for his home in Pittsburgh. Boone, who has been confined to a hospital with a leg injury, decided to return to his home when doctors advised him his leg would not heal before the season closed.

Sunday's season closing double header between the Twins and Grand Forks in Moorhead League park has been designated "Arthur Day" in tribute to the fans of Arthur N. D., who have been making faithful pilgrimages to the local enclosure all season. If possible, Manager Jack Knight will send Charlie Suche to the slab in one of the two games. Suche is Arthur's most popular Twin.

## CAMPBELL DRIVES BLUEBIRD 299.874 FOR NEW RECORD

BARELY FAILS TO ATTAIN HIS GOAL OF 300 MILE AN HOUR AVERAGE.

Hits 304 On First Measured Mile But Drops Far Below That Mark On Return Trip.

Bonneville Salt Flats, Utah, Sept. 3. (UP)—Sir Malcolm Campbell, British speed king, barely failed to attain his goal of driving 300 miles per hour here today.

He drove the first measured mile at 304.311 but dropped below that mark on the return which, under American Automobile Association rules, must be made within an hour.

His average for the two runs was 299.874 miles per hour. Although he set a new world's record, Campbell was dejected because he fell short of 300 miles per hour. He said he would not run again today but probably would make another trial early tomorrow.

The Bluebird made the second run in 12.005 seconds, a speed of 295.566 miles per hour.

By a mere five thousandths of a second, Sir Malcolm missed setting a new record of 300 miles per hour. Barely making his second run within the allotted hour after his first run, the Englishman roared the Bluebird back to the starting point at 10 a. m. CST.

His fastest speed was the first lap when he went 304.311 miles per hour.

A four mile per hour wind on the back track slowed the Bluebird nine miles per hour to pull the average below the 300 mile per hour mark.

New York, Sept. 3 (UP)—Fresh evidence that you can't take anything for granted where the Cardinals are concerned was furnished by the first game of the St. Louis-Pittsburgh doubleheader yesterday.

Detroit wrested a double header from the Chicago White Sox 6-1, and 5-0. The Tigers' lead is six games. St. Louis defeated Cleveland 4-1, but the Indians rallied to take the second game 7-2. Jack Wilson's home in the 11th gave the Boston Red Sox a 9-8 victory over Washington but the Senators gained an even break by winning the nightcap 3-2, in 13 innings.
