



By ED EASTMAN Lack of weight and reserve strength are the biggest obstacles Coach Chet Gilpin has to face with his Moorhead State Teachers college high school football squad in preparation for the opening game of the season at Detroit Lakes Sept. 17.

Although 11 lettermen are back this year, the loss of several of last year's stars, especially in the small squad, which will number 20 at the most.

4 Lettermen Backs.

In the backfield four lettermen will be available, but they are all small and the Baby Dragon offense MEET IN FINALS must depend on speed and decep-tion this year, with power plays out of the picture. Captain Sig Stusiak at halfback tops the list of letter winners last year. Dayton Baldwin, fullback, and Don O'Day and Porter Berglund, quarterbacks, are the other lettermen in the backfield. Freeman Fountain, a reserve last year, is slated for the other halfback post. Other candidates for backfield jobs are Philserves last year, and Ralph Davis. a transfer student from St. Joseph, Mo., where he earned a letter in track.
