

Notre Dame Protects Unbeaten Record; Southern Cal Fights For Prestige.

Los Angeles, Dec. 3 (UP)—In a football game that even the Hollywood press agents have to admit is tremendous, stupendous, and slightly colossal, the Trojans of Southern California meet the Irish of Notre Dame in Memorial coli-

The game, which means so much to both teams, is certain to be watched by 95.000 spectators, and there is a good chance that every one of the coliseum's 101.000 seats will be occupied. With all the choice seats long sold, the scalpers did a brisk business among those customers willing to pay upwards 13th in Series.

Today's game, the thirteenth in a series, finds the glamorous Irish in Los Angeles with an unbeaten and untied team for the first time since Knute Rockne's mighty eleven of 1930. Already triumphant over Kansas. Georgia Tech, Illinois, Carnegie Tech, Army, Navy, Minnesota and Northwestern, a victory today would give the South Benders rousing claim to the national championship of 1938.
