

MSTC Ends Season Against Winona, Cobbers Face Oles

Moorhead Attack Clicks As Spuds Score 32-24 Win Over Fargo Cagers

WELL-KNIT ORANGE AND BLACK MACHINE LEADS AT HALF, 19-14.

Domek Men Appear Ready For Tournament Play, Meet Staples Next Friday.

By ED EASTMAN Moorhead high school's basketball team served notice Friday night that it is just about at its peak for tournament competition by scoring a 32-24 victory over Fargo high on the Midget floor.

Though the Spuds had no chance for inter-city prep honors, having already lost twice to the Midgets previously this season, the victory was satisfying to Moorhead basketball fans who have seen the Spuds develop during the season from a mediocre team into an aggressive, hard-driving, well-knit squad.

Play Staples Next. Moorhead has only one more game before entering the district tournament here March 8, the Spuds going to Staples next Friday for what should prove an adequate test of the Moorhead team's strength.

Coach Roy Domek has been endeavoring all season to whip his team into a frame of mind where they will start playing an aggressive brand of ball from the opening whistle instead of waiting for the second half to open up their attack. The Spuds did just that from the start of the game last night and when the two teams left the floor at the half, the Orange and Black cagers held a 19-14 lead.

Hirsch Leads Spuds. With George Hirsch back in condition after a siege of illness, the Moorhead attack functioned beautifully. The Spuds going out in front with six minutes of the second quarter gone and staying in the lead for the rest of the fray. Five of the seven men Domek used figured in the scoring, with Hirsch getting five baskets to set the pace. Bob Wicklund, fast-developing guard, tossed in four field goals and a free throw for nine points while Paul Hanson scored five counters and Pete Young and Harold Erickson four each.

Lloyd Percho was the Fargo star with nine points while Odd Jacobson tallied four. The loss of Jerry Mulready, regular center, because of illness, hurt the Midgets' chances.

Fargo Goes Ahead. At the outset it looked like Fargo was going to score another easy victory, running up six points before Hirsch finally got the first Moorhead basket after four minutes of play. Two more baskets by Hirsch and one by Erickson gave the Spuds an 8-6 lead, but Cliff Rothrock tied the score at 8-8 just before the end of the quarter.

Fargo forged into an 11-8 lead as the second period started but Hirsch counted again and Wicklund added a free throw to tie the score. Percho tallied for the Midgets but Wicklund once more knotted the count at 13-13. Then Paul Hanson, rangy center, got his first bucket with 1 1/2 minutes to play and this was the signal for a spurt which gave Moorhead a five-point advantage at the half.

In the third period the Midgets advanced within two points of the Spuds with a minute of the quarter left but Wicklund and Hanson scored in short order to increase the Moorhead margin to 27-21 going into the fourth quarter, in which the Domek men outscored the Midgets, 5-4.

Concordia Meets Tommies Here Monday, Plays Mayville Teachers Next Week.

Moorhead State Teachers college cagers, intra-city basketball champions, will close their season here tonight against Winona Teachers while Concordia faces St. Olaf in a Minnesota College conference engagement.

The Dragons face Winona, Northern Teachers College conference leader, in a game set at 8 o'clock in the MSTC gym. The Cobber-St. Olaf clash is set for the same time in the Moorhead Junior high school with a preliminary planned for 7 o'clock.

Cobber Schedule Extended. While three members of the Dragon squad close their college careers tonight, the Cobbers with only one senior on the squad, Duane Fiskum, coach Joe Rogstad's quint plays its last home game here Monday against St. Thomas, then finishes the season at Mayville Wednesday or Thursday against Mayville Teachers.

Orville Schwankl, veteran forward who played a brilliant part in the Dragon victory over Concordia Thursday, Bert Martin, all-conference guard last year who has been hampered by injuries this season, and Vernon Zehren, who has been used at both forward and guard positions this season, are the three seniors on the MSTC squad.

Four Regulars Return. Glen Preston, stellar center leading the Northern Teachers loop in scoring at the present, is a sophomore, as is Fred Kellett, regular guard, Jack Weiting, who has been holding down guard post since Martin's injury, is a junior, while Chuck Putney is a freshman. So Coach Alex Nemzek will have four of his five regulars back next year.

The Dragons took a 49-44 beating from Winona on an excursion southward earlier this season but with the advantage of playing on their home floor the Crimson are given a good chance of turning back the league leaders. Victory or defeat means little to the Dragons, for as the standings are concerned, for the Moorhead quint has but two victories in seven league starts but a triumph would put a satisfying climax on a rather disappointing season.

Winona clinched the title by defeating St. Cloud last night, 42-38. Have Defeated Oles. The only bright spot in the MSTC record this season is the retention of the intra-city championship, which they held by defeating Concordia in two out of three starts. Five wins in 16 starts is the Dragon record at present.

Concordia scored a 42-39 conquest of St. Olaf in their first meeting this season and in order to bring their conference standing up to an even 500 the Cobbers must win their last two league games. The present record of 10-10 record is four victories and six losses. St. Olaf has won only three out of 10 conference starts but the Oles have been known as giant-killers all season, having turned in several upsets.

The main Cobber task will be to stop Stan Sheimo, high-scoring St. Olaf ace.

The Hoosiers run into Minnesota tonight and Ohio State plays at Wisconsin in the two title games. In the other two, Illinois plays at Northwestern and Michigan invades Purdue. Hopes are high down at Bloomington, Ind. for the first time in two weeks. Although its foe is tough Minnesota, which once was a prohibitive title favorite, Indiana is at full strength.

MARKS MAY FALL IN GARDEN MEET

SEVEN WORLD RECORDS WITH- IN STRIKING DISTANCE, SAY EXPERTS.

New York, Feb. 25 (UP)—The 51st national amateur indoor track and field championships go on in Madison Square Garden tonight. Records and defending champions are expected to fall like 10 pins at a bowling congress.

The boys who know about such things say seven world records are within striking distance of the athletes; three are a little further, beyond their grasp and two meet marks are sure to topple. A dozen champions will be in there trying to repeat but the dope is that only five can be backed safely with money.

The men who will compete for the 16 titles compose the cream of the track world—37 who have won national titles at 28 intermediate championships; 10 who have broken world records; two Olympic champions and athletes from 24 colleges.

The Baby Dragons collected a total of 20 fouls and lost Ed Saddle, Sig Stuslak and Durwood Hegland because of them. The Lakers were charged with 12 personals.

The teams each scored the same number of field goals, but the Lakers connected from the free throw line in 13 out of 24 tries while the Baby Dragons made 3 out of 13.

Rey on Fast Break. The Detroit Lakes team relied mainly on a fast break, utilizing this to good advantage in shaking men loose to score on long passes after one Detroit Lakes player, Jack Brown, had gone out on fouls early in the first half.

The outstanding player on the floor was Sig Stuslak, who, though closely guarded, connected for 6 field goals which, together with his two free throws, gave him 14 points.

Deike Leads Lakers. High scoring honors for the evening went to Marvel Deike of the Lakers with eight free throws and four field goals for a total of 16 points. Outstanding for the Lakers also was the play of Duane Buck who played well defensively in addition to scoring nine points.
