ATHLETES ARRIVE TO PARTICIPATE IN CLASSIC AT MSTC

TRACK, FIELD STARS FROM THREE STATES COMPETE IN ANNUAL MEET.

340 To Vie For New Records; Finals Will Get Under Way Tonight At 8:15.

Squads of college, high school and junior high school athletes—340 of them—from three states were converging on Moorhead today to participate in the annual Dragon relays at Memorial field, Moorhead State Teachers college, tonight.

Preliminaries in several events and finals in the high schools discuss throw and college shot put were to be held this afternoon. The relays and finals in the special events will be run off tonight, starting at 8:15.

With ideal weather prevailing, a fast track and speedy field, numerous records were expected to fall.

Ten Colleges Enter.
While the relays hold the greatest interest of track fans, several special events appear likely to appeal to the fans. One of the new features this year is a two-mile race in the college class, which has attracted 10 entries. The winner will receive the Thomas Hannahan trophy. Nial Budrow, MSTC freshman who won the event in a triangular meet at Wahpeton last week, is one of the favorites.

The college 100-yard dash is also expected to provide some fireworks with Horace Johnson, firstfooted University of North Dakota negro, expected to shatter the meet record.

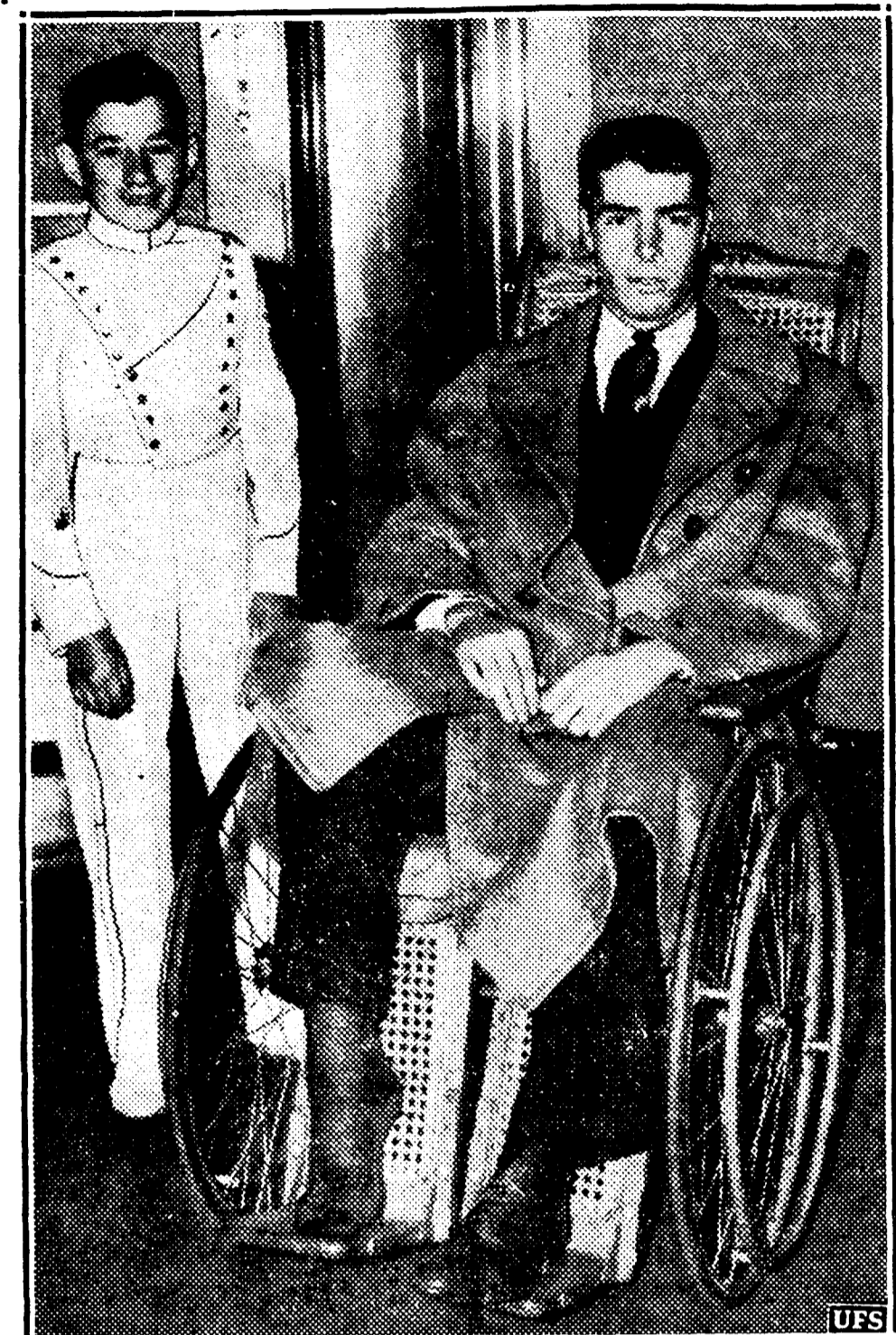

Twins Make Loop Debut At Barnett Field Tonight

Fargo-Moorhead Club Opens Northern League Season Against Winnipeg Maroons At 8:30; Bob Haas To Hurl Against Hank Miklos.

Two southpaws will match slants tonight as the Fargo-Moorhead Twins make their season debut in the Northern League against the Winnipeg Maroons in a game slated to start at 8:30 under the Barnett field lights.

Bob Haas, home town boy, will be on the mound for the Twins while Hank Miklos, a veteran who is always tough for the Twins to beat, will start for the Maroons.

Elaborate opening day ceremonies have been planned with a parade preceding the opening of activities at the park. Steve Gorman, president of the Twins, expects a large opening attendance.

The Winnipeg Maroons, under the direction of their new manager, Joe Mowry, arrived in Fargo Thursday from Shakopee where they had spring training quarters. Both

teams were slated for light work-out this morning.

JOHNSTOWN HOLDS FAVORED POST FOR DERBY SATURDAY

WILLIAM WOODWARD COLT TO FACE FIELD OF 9 OTHER HOPEFULS.

Blue Skies, Fast Track Forecast Tomorrow To Boost Favorite's Chances.

Louisville, Ky., May 5 (UP)—As the first slants of dawn brightened the bluegrass land today, a handful of men filed into a rickety office at Churchill Downs and dropped into a little white box the names of the horses who will vie for the flowers and fortune of the 65th Kentucky derby.

It was a solemn, serious business, because tomorrow before 90,000 witnesses one of those names will be lettered in gold and green on the honor roll of famous thoroughbreds.

115 Enter Originally.
There were 115 young hopefuls sent along on a \$25 gamble when nominations closed last March, but only 10 were considered worth the \$500 entry fee that was to be posted today. Here are the horses entered:

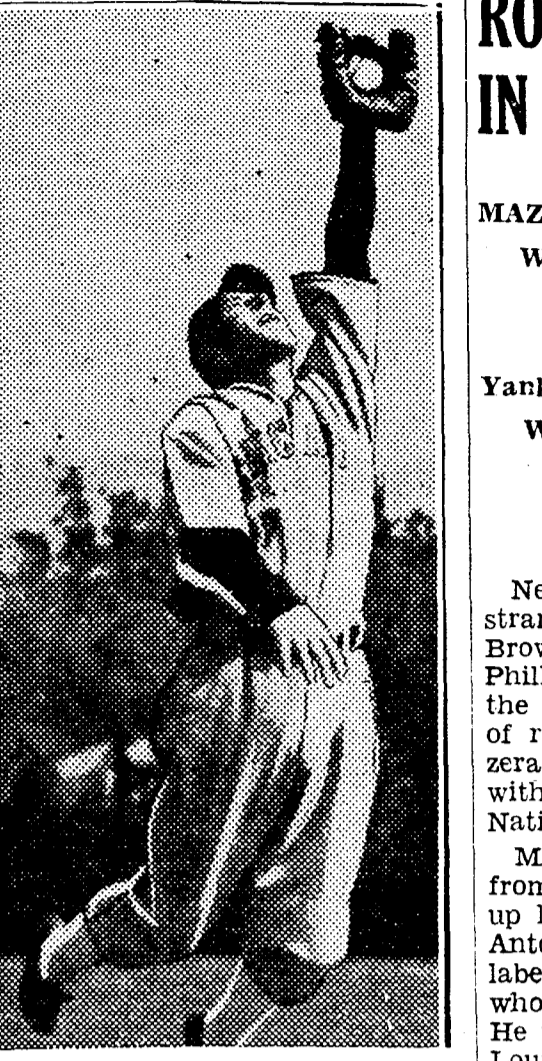

ST. LOUIS, PHILLY ROOKIES SET PACE IN MAJOR LEAGUES

MAZZERA LEADS BROWNS TO WIN OVER A's; MAY PACES PHILADELPHIA.

Yanks Pound Feller From Box To Win, 10-6; Ted Williams Hits Two Homers.

New York, May 5 (UP)—Two strangers, Mel Mazzer of the Browns and Merrill May of the Phillies, commanded attention from the baseball flock today with a pair of robust batting averages—Mazzer leading the American league with .567 and May pacesmaking the National with .447.

Mazzer is a 25-year-old Italian from Stockholm, Calif., who came up last year from the Brown's San Antonio Texas league farm club labeled "an exceptional outfielder who may improve as a batsman." He played in 86 games with St. Louis last year and hit .279.

Hits Two Homers.
This spring Mazzer didn't get his chance until Beau Bell and Mel Alameda failed to hit. He started his first game against the Indians April 28. He smacked three hits, and nobody's stopped him since. His hits total 17 in six games. He wanged out two homers and a single yesterday against the Athletics, driving in four runs as the Browns won 9-3, behind Rookie John Henry Kramer's eighth-inning pitching.

May is a refugee from the Yankee chain system. Imagine being drafted from the Yanks' Newark club, and winding up with the Phillies. That's what happened to May. An injury kept him from starting a game until April 22. He didn't make a hit that day, but the next day he got his first safety and he hit safely in his tenth straight game yesterday by having a perfect "3 for 3" day against the Pirates. The Phils bowed to Pittsburgh, 6-4, when Russ Bauers allowed only one hit in 4-2-3 innings of relief work.

Yanks Shell Feller.
An doubt about how the Yanks are was removed yesterday when they beat Bullet Bob Feller, Cleveland's pride and joy, 10-6, in 10 innings. Feller had the Yanks beat, 6-4, going into the ninth but they tied the score and won in the tenth with a four-run rally which blew Feller from the mound. Babs Dahlgren, Gehrig's substitute, went hitless in six trips.

The Boston Red Sox rallied to beat Detroit, 7-6. Rookie Ted Williams hit two homers, driving in five runs.

Washington's five-game winning streak was snapped by the White Sox, who won, 4-3, and ousted the Senators from third place. Catcher Ken Sylvestri, St. Paul rookie, hit a homer with a mate aboard.

Salvo Wins First One
Despite wildness, Manuel Salvo, San Diego rookie, hung on for the full route and won his first National league game as the Giants coped their third straight from the Cardinals, 6-3. Lon Warneke, who had pitched two shutouts, weakened in the eighth and was taken out after Jorges tripled.

Even with their ace, Bill Lee, in the box, the Cubs continued their nose dive, losing to Brooklyn, 6-2, for their third straight loss. Lee was knocked out in the third, and charged with his third loss in a row. Van Mungo did a brilliant job after relieving Boots Poffenberger in the first with the bases loaded.

Locating the Challenger
Louisville, Ky., May 5 — The advance guard now pouring into Louisville is groping vainly but valiantly to find a horse which might beat Johnstown—at a much better price. Many of these have given up and are now trying to locate a needle in a haystack.

A year ago, they felt almost the same way about Fighting Fox — and the majority left Lawrin ride in at 8 or 9 to 1. Now they are looking in a vague, foggy direction toward Challedon, Technician, Challenge, El Chico, Xalapa Clown, Porter's Mite, Steel Heels, Viscosity and others. They are waiting for the price which the mutuels will show. Most of the challengers have already been beaten in the last week or so. It was something of a shock when Viscosity nailed Technician by a head, but Technician's supporters—many of them, anyway—are still looking to the longer route.

Eloquent Words Spoken.
Many eloquent words are written and spoken about "improving the breed." But, leaving all hypocrisy aside, the main purpose of racing among 99 per cent of all concerned is cashing a winning ticket — at the longer odds, if possible.

They know Johnstown is the horse to beat. But where the sharpshooters go to form, a big part of the mob goes to the price where you might collect much for only a little.
