Askegaard received a commission as second lieutenant at the first "military tournament" conducted Saturday at NDAC. Miss Wilson and Muriel Schroeder, Glyndon, were awarded honorary commissions as co-ed sponsors. The entire cadet corps took part in the parade, review and retreat ceremony. Twenty-nine seniors received commissions in the organized reserve corps of the army.

The graduating students represent 40 North Dakota counties, four outside states, the Territory of Hawaii and Canton, China.  
Major John L. Griffith, for 16 years commissioner of athletics in the Big Ten conference, will give the commencement address at 10:30 a. m. in Festival hall. His address, "New Frontiers," will follow the impressive procession scheduled for 10 a. m.

Baccalaureate services and senior class exercises will be conducted Sunday afternoon, June 4. Dr. Frank L. Eversull, NDAC president, will give the sermon, "Fulfilling Destiny." The services will be in Festival hall.
