### ELIMINATIONS SET FOR WEDNESDAY; FUNERAL GROUP NAMES OFFICERS.

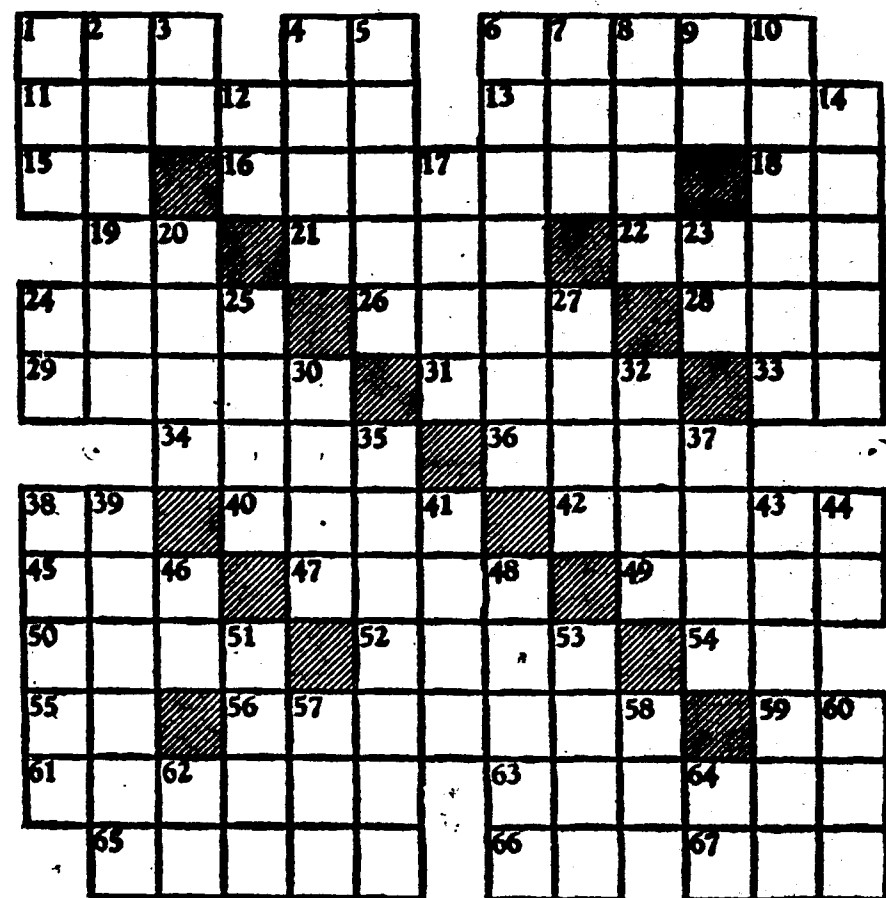
