Continued from page 1. In Wisconsin fell short of its objective. His backers had expected four and claimed six of the state's 24 democratic national convention delegates.

But despite the handicap of division among third-termers which put two Roosevelt delegate slates in the field, Mr. Roosevelt apparently has won 21 of the state's slate leaving three for Garner. New dealers expect to do as well if not better in next week's Illinois primary where Mr. Roosevelt will oppose the vice president again. And in Nebraska the president is unopposed so that state's 14 delegates are in the bag.

Wisconsin Backs FR

Republicans merely elected convention delegates in yesterday's Wisconsin primary. Democrats not only elected delegates but ran a popularity contest as well in which voters could put their (X) beside the name of either the president or vice president on the ballot. In that popularity contest Mr. Roosevelt was ahead three to one on the basis of early returns. Significant, however, is the fact that a large minority group of Wisconsin democrats are opposed to a third term despite the fact they were unable to make much showing in the delegate elections.

Primary returns indicated that progressives were not active in the primary although both sides had bid for their support, new dealers to balk the anti-third term group and Vandenberg's supporters to stop Dewey. Significant in the poll was the aggregate Dewey delegate poll which was larger than any other. And republicans cast a greater aggregate vote than did democrats.
