Processing of Beets Under Way

Full Operations To Begin October 1

Lifting of sugar beets, now under way in Clay county, is expected to be in full operation after October 1, according to officials of the American Crystal Sugar company, East Grand Forks.

The company began processing Monday on what is predicted to be the best crop in its history in the Red River Valley. At present only enough beets are being lifted to supply the East Grand Forks and Chaska plants but after October 1 storage operations will begin.

Already at the plant are more than 6,000 tons of beets from the Moorhead-Fargo area. Yield is estimated to reach an average of 10 tons to the acre throughout the Red River Valley while M. F. Williams, a representative of the company, estimates the Clay county crop will yield 12 tons to the acre.

The best previous yield was eight tons. Clay county has 3,000 acres of the valley's 26,000 acres which are planted in beets.

Mobilization of Local Guard Seen In November

Continued from page 1. Gates said, because they would be placed on the inactive list until then.

Men who join Battery F now will have the advantage of being among friends when the guard is mobilized, Gates said, since men of the battery will train together at the same camp. A man who is trained, however, may be sent to an entirely different camp from that of his next-door neighbor, he said.

Troops Join Today. An additional 35,700 men will be added to federal service on October 15 by President Roosevelt's call last night while today approximately 60,500 guardsmen were inducted into army service. They were the first units to be incorporated into the army, having been called by the president on September 2. Total strength of the guard is about 240,000 and all will be placed in training.

A few of the units which were mobilized today were able to leave immediately for their training centers, but officers estimated it would take 10 days to get the 60,500 men into camps. Men reported at their armories and were formally inducted into federal service by brief ceremonies.

Units Listed. Included among the units ordered mobilized on October 15 was the 32nd division (less the 32nd tank company), Michigan and Wisconsin, which will report to Camp Beauregard, La. Units from New York, New Jersey, North Carolina, Georgia, Oklahoma, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Montana, Wyoming, New Hampshire, Delaware, Illinois, Missouri, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Maine, Rhode Island, Connecticut, Virginia and Arkansas were included.

WPA Classes, Clubs Arranged

Study Program Will Start September 24

The adult education program of the works project administration, sponsored by the state department of education, is initiating classes for the year in Moorhead and vicinity, according to Theodore Lacle, district supervisor of adult education.

Emphasized in this program will be citizenship and government, intended especially for those who expect to obtain their naturalization papers. Remedial classes will be held in English, sociology and history. A study club, with special library privileges, will be organized. There will also be a business girls' club intended to fill the cultural and social as well as the professional needs of prospective and active business girls. The Moorhead Dramatic club, in connection with the Radio club, will be active again.

These classes will follow approximately the same program as they did last year. They will be under the supervision of Miss Adair Ash, 511 Eleventh street south, who has just returned from an adult education institute in Minneapolis. She will have charge of enrollment in all classes and may be reached by calling 3-1970.

German Invasion of Norway Will Be Subject of Talk

Labor Delegates Seek Revisions

Would Modify State's Labor Relations Act

St. Paul, Sept. 17 (UP)—Delegates to the Minnesota convention of the American Federation of Labor act today on resolutions, including a proposal for modification rather than repeal of the state labor relations act.

Sixty resolutions were sent to the resolutions and legislative committees last night at the close of the first day of the convention. About two-thirds of the proposed resolutions dealt with legislative matters.

Disagreement was anticipated on the convention floor over the federation's stand on the state labor law. Robert A. Olson, Duluth, state federation president, yesterday recommended amendment rather than outright repeal of the law. Many delegates maintained, however, that the law should be repealed.

Among other resolutions was one which proposed that union men called into military service should be exempted from payment of union dues.

William Green, AFL president, will address the convention banquet tonight.
