Military Rites For Naval Man

Services For Bowers At Lake Park Church

Arrangements are being made for military funeral services for Hanson Wayne Bowers, 25-year-old Lake Park man who died Saturday at Mare Island hospital, San Francisco, Calif.

Defeated arrangements will await the arrival of Mrs. Bowers, who will arrive with the body Friday night. Services will be held in the Lake Park Lutheran church, with Reverend A. J. Anders in charge.

Mr. Bowers was born in Albany, Wis., May 12, 1916. In 1920 he moved with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Martin Bowers, to a farm in Clay county. They lived there for eight years before moving to Lake Park.

In 1936 in California, he enlisted in the pharmacy service of the United States navy for four years. After completing this enlistment he re-enlisted in 1940. While serving at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, last April, he was taken sick and was moved to the hospital at Mare Island.

He leaves his wife, the former Miss Lorraine Mayne, whom he married April 23, 1938, at Sonora, Calif.

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185 Educators Attend Meeting

Audio-Visual Aids Topic Discussed

"Interesting, informative and helpful" was what the 185 educators who attended said about the audio-visual aid conference, held Wednesday at Concordia college in Moorhead and at the Horace Mann school in Fargo.

Registration records showed that 185 different educators had registered; the aggregate attendance at all the sessions was about 225.

Dr. A. M. Christensen, MSTC head of the planning committee, said the conference had been more successful than members of the committee had anticipated, and that more interest was evidenced in the conference than they had expected.

The conference began at 2:00 p. m. with round table discussions and demonstrations of some of the common means of audio and visual aids. This session was held at the Horace Mann school.

O. S. Anderson, principal of the Horace Mann school, introduced the subject. Kiwanians Hear Dr. J. N. Brown

Dosland Named Head of Speakers' Bureau

"We are fighting a war of philosophies. On one side is the philosophy of war and plunder and totalitarianism and on the other side is the philosophy of freedom," Dr. J. N. Brown, Concordia college president, pointed out to Kiwanis club members at the noon luncheon at the Comstock hotel today.

Recently returned from a meeting in Baltimore of the association of college presidents, Dr. Brown said "this meeting stressed the importance of education in the present war and the post-war period."

"It is from the colleges and universities of the land that the government expects to get its specialists for various jobs, not only to win the war but also for the period after the war," he continued.

Speaking about Germany, Dr. Brown said we are fighting against the Nazi philosophy and not necessarily the German people. He quoted a British representative at the Baltimore meeting, who declared "The Kaiser was an angel in comparison to the present German leadership."

Appointment of C. G. Dosland as chairman of the Kiwanis speakers' bureau for national defense was announced by President Lee Myler. H. M. Dale was program chairman for the meeting.

It is planned to have available maps, charts, and other appropriate visual material to make the discussions clear and reference easy.

Other meetings will be devoted to such subjects as "How to Win the War of Nerves," directed by members of the psychology department; "Maintaining Health and Vitality in War Time"; "Daylight Saving and Other Factors in Conservation"; "Slogans and American Ideals"; "Interpreting Radio and Press Dispatches of the War"; "Price Fixing"; "What is Involved in the Pacific Conflict?"; "Winning the Peace"; "Weather and Science in the War," etc.

These meetings are planned to supplement and not to conflict with the first-aid programs which are being carried on by the national Red Cross organization with the cooperation of Miss Flora Frick and the physical education department at the college Tuesday evenings.

The wartime policies committee includes Dr. Schwendeman as chairman; Dr. Snarr; Dr. A. M. Christensen, head of the education department; Dr. Glenn C. Dildine, head of the science division; Miss Georgina Lommen, director of the campus school; Professor Byron D. Murray, head of the literature and language division; and Professor Bridges.

Acting with Dr. G. L. Goslee, resident director, the committee will give general direction to the discussion programs and is working on other problems in connection with the emergency, including the advisability of accelerating the college calendar so as to make available enough teachers for rural schools and for industrial arts and physical education departments, in

all of which there is now a shortage. Also such acceleration is being studied as a means whereby to make students available for needed agricultural and industrial work during vacation periods.

War savings stamps have been put on sale in the college exchange in MacLean hall, supplementing the already substantial sale of stamps in the campus school. Special courses in keeping with the war program will be set up as needed for college students.

It was emphasized by Dr. Snarr that the evening courses are open to citizens without restriction, and that they may attend any or all sessions. The first meeting January 26 is scheduled for room 236 on the second floor of MacLean hall, with provision for larger quarters if the need arises.

(Continued from Page 1) der William L. Burt, division of industry operations and priorities, under J. S. Knowlson; labor division, under Sidney Hillman, and civilian supply division, under Leon Henderson.

A new automobile branch also was created with supreme authority for conversion of the industry to wartime production delegated to Ernest Kanzler, former Ford Motor company executive. Kanzler, who will have offices in Detroit, will make decisions "on the spot." He will have advisers from the ranks of labor and industry and from the army and navy.

There will be other divisions, such as those on information, administration and statistics, but they will not be concerned chiefly with the problems of production—as will the six major divisions.

There can be no debate, no argument about it, Nelson said, for time is here to get the job done. Nelson is going on the assumption that management and labor are anxious to cooperate. If there are instances where one or the other doesn't want to go along, then steps will be taken.
