Gin-more than plenty, but this isn't a gin-drinking nation. (Yet, with summer, Jackson said, gin inventories may drop, "Thanks to a guy named Tom Collins.")

Rum and Brandies-too much on hand now. Not selling so well "since some unscrupulous dealers gyped customers with forced tiein sales during the war-prompted whisky shortage."

Scotch (imported)—very scarce. Only about one-third the normal supply—just like last year. Straight whisky—supply outlook night clothes.


