Resolution Urges Housing Action

A resolution urging establishment of a housing authority corporation by the Moorhead city council has been passed by the Albert E. Johnson post number 1223, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

The resolution approved by the post reads as follows: Whereas, it is common knowledge that the housing situation in the city of Moorhead is, to quote the honorable mayor, "deplorable";

Whereas, it is estimated that upwards of 500 Veterans will be returning to the city of Moorhead, many of whom will require housing accommodations which are not at present available in the city of Moorhead; and

Whereas, it has come to the attention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States that the city of Moorhead is pending an application with the Federal Government for a number of military surplus quonset huts in an endeavor to partially relieve the drastic housing shortage in the city of Moorhead.

Now, therefore, be, and it is hereby resolved in open meeting of the Albert E. Johnson Post No. 1223 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States in Moorhead, Minnesota, that the city council of the city of Moorhead, be, and it is hereby respectfully petitioned as follows, to-wit:

1. That every effort be made on the part of the city of Moorhead to obtain said quonset huts at the earliest possible date and that in assigning said huts for the use of the veterans, that the application of those veterans who were actively engaged in combat duties on foreign soil receive prior consideration.

2. That inasmuch, as said quonset huts will not even begin to fill the housing needs of the city of Moorhead; that the city council make arrangements to establish a housing authority corporation for the purpose of building numerous housing units to be rented first to returning veterans who were engaged in foreign combat, and second to other returning veterans, and the balance, if any, for the use of the general public.

3. It is further respectfully petitioned that due to the extreme, drastic need for housing in the city of Moorhead, that the city council of the city of Moorhead proceed immediately to furnish housing as petitioned in paragraphs one and two of this resolution.

Concordia Choir Tour To Start

Pacific Coast, Canada Are Concert Sites

Sunday morning the Concordia college concert choir will embark on its 26th annual tour this year to the Pacific coast and Canada. For a period of three weeks the choir will travel throughout North Dakota, Montana, Idaho, Oregon, Washington and British Columbia with a concert scheduled daily.

With the exception of a steamboat excursion between Seattle, Wash., and Vancouver, B. C., the choir will travel by train and chartered bus.

Accompanying the singers on the 1946 tour are Director Paul J. Christiansen, Thelma Halvorson, voice instructor, and L. A. Moe, business manager. Limited baggage is carried by all 62 choir members and choir stands and gowns are shipped via express.

When the choir returns February 20, a home concert is scheduled in the Moorhead armory. Choir concerts include a program of approximately 15 numbers which are all sung by memory. Numbers include "Be Not Afraid," by Bach, "O Praise Ye God," by Tschalkowsky and other music besides several choral anthems arranged by F. Melius Christiansen. "The Lost Star," an original composition by Director Paul Christiansen is also included on the repertoire.

(Continued from Page 1) four times the diameter of the Earth, but is surrounded by an enormous volume of air and methane vapor, equal in mass to about fifteen Earths.

Barometer pressure on Saturn must be vacuum thin. Here on Earth we have a fluid ocean of air about the solid ball of the Earth, but our air is only seven miles thick, on the average. All our weather is contained in this thin seven mile air shell. But on Saturn, nearly all the bulk of what we see as the planet is made of air. Saturn has numerous moons, the gravity pulls of which set up many cross currents and storms in Saturn's air. Saturn's air is often filled with these storms, but because Saturn's moons are small, with weak gravity, weather on Saturn is a relatively tame affair.

The big question is, when the Solar System was created, why did the planet Saturn get so much air? Between the dust in the rings and the methane in the air, Saturn turns out to be pretty near all gas and light material. But why?

Nobody knows! It is unsolved problems like this that make the science of the sky so fascinating. It is a profitable kind of fascination, too, because every astronomical discovery made so far has been followed by related inventions in other fields that raised our living standards. It will be so again when the question of Saturn, its rings and its great gassy atmosphere is solved, we feel sure.

Questions and Answers Q. Will an open gas heater in a closed room hurt a baby's health? Mrs. T. E. E. Mo.

A. Definitely so. An open gas flame discharges carbon dioxide into the air and often carbon monoxide also. Both are poisonous. The heater should have a flue in every case.

Q. I have to go somewhere for my health, because I have had winter colds. Where should I go? O.L.W. N. Y.

A. New Jersey is good. So are the Adirondacks. Southern Texas has an excellent climate for people with winter ills. The Ozarks are not bad either. You should get away from city crowds and city soot.

Q. What is the real starting point on a thermometer, freezing water of boiling water, H.T.K., Wis.

A. Fahrenheit, Reamur and Celsius all began with freezing water at zero. But they all differed as to what boiling should be. Fahrenheit made it 180, Reamur made it 80, and Celsius made it 100. Fahrenheit had the best logic, because 180 has the most even divisors. Then he went on a quest for absolute zero and with salt and ice got down to 32, which he erroneously thought was as cold as one could get, and which he called 0. This made his boiling point 212.

At that, the Fahrenheit thermometer is the most practical for most purposes.
