Enrollment High In City Schools

Classes Open Today; Register At MSTC

Hundreds of Moorhead children and college students took text books under their arms today as classes began in all city schools and registration was underway at Moorhead State Teachers college.

Figures on attendance were incomplete yet but officials believed there would be an increase over last year. At junior high school Principal Thomas A. Kloster had enrolled 136 in seventh grade, 132 in eighth and 166 in ninth, including 32 who registered today. Those figures are 15 per cent more than a year ago the first day, he said. Students were still registering at senior high school so no figures were available, but Principal A. P. Diercks said enrollment was "definitely higher."

Registration continues Wednesday at MSTC with the first social function of the year planned in the gymnasium in the form of a "get acquainted" party for freshmen and new students from 8 to 10 p. m. The student commission, headed by Harry Haaskamp, president, is making arrangements.

St. Joseph's parochial school and the MSTC campus school also opened today. Concordia college will begin freshman orientation September 13 with upperclassmen registering September 16 and 17. Classes begin September 18.

Teaching staff of the senior high school was complete Saturday with the selection of Miss Saima Kiskananen, Kinney, to teach mathematics in place of Horace Goodhue, who will be on leave of absence while training at Fort Monroe, Va. After his three-months training period it is expected he will be an instructor in the national guard training school in California.

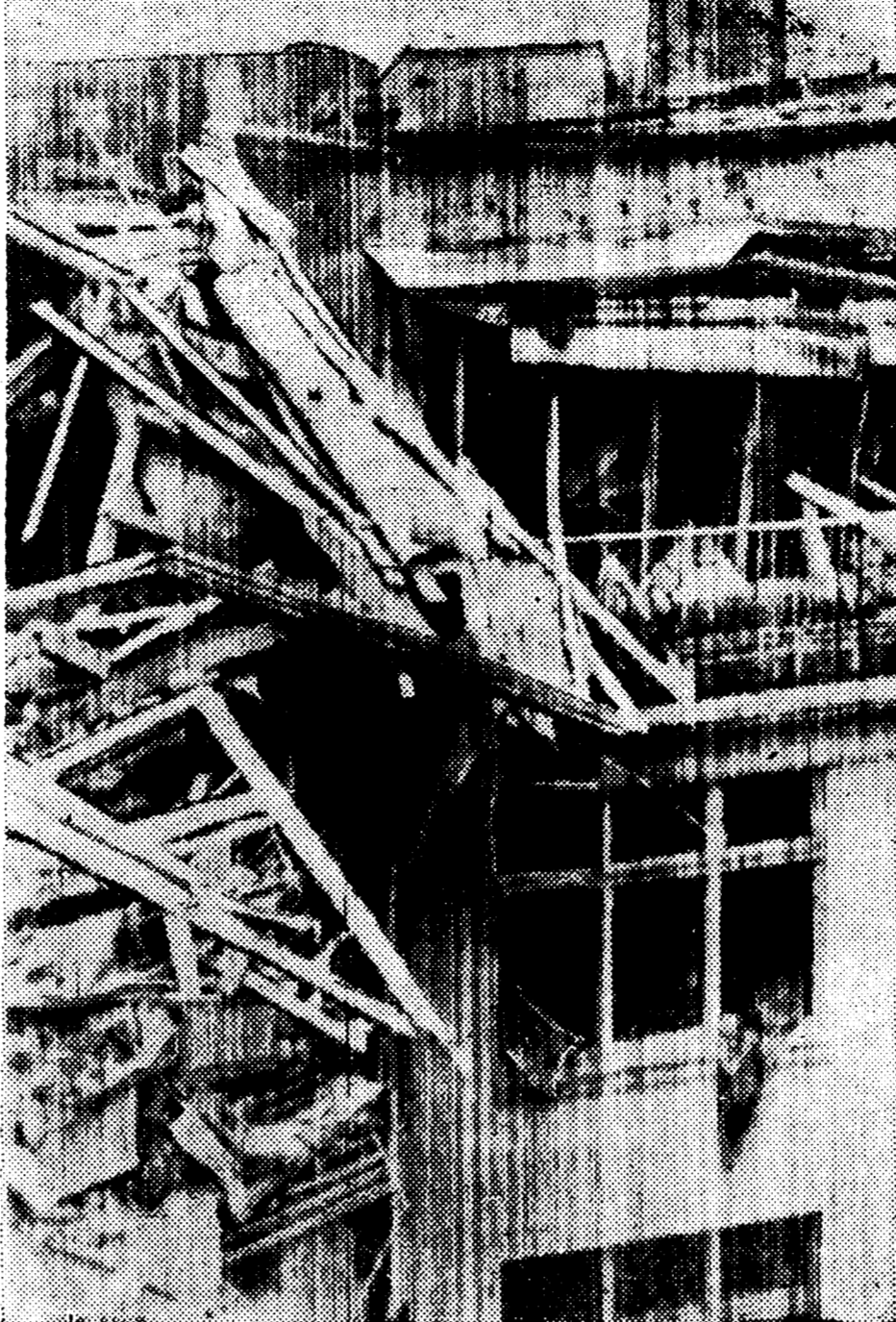
